- Ensure easy accessibility to encourage independent learning.
- Allow the child to choose the activities. These can be repeated too
- Encourage routines and procedures around pack-up and clean-up.

Dear parents,

To encourage creativity and imaginative play along with skill-based learning, here are some hands-on activity suggestions for the week.

Let's Pour

Materials Required :

- Rice/ semolina/ pulses (1 bowl)
- 1 Paper cone/ actual funnel
- 1 plastic Jar/ bottle
- 1 Tray
- 1 Scoop/ spoon

How to

- Child to scoop the rice/semolina/pulses into the scoop/ spoon.
- Encourage the child to pour the dry material into the jar/ bottle through a paper cone/ actual funnel.
- Encourage the child to continue even if there is a mess.
- The materials may be saved for further reuse



Messy Play

Materials Required:

- Old newspaper
- Green paint
- Paint brush
- 2-3 green leaves/ leaf cutouts (different sizes)
- Wild animal toys (actual) / images from old magazines
- Glue



Mess Alert

How to

- Child to paint the leaves/ cutouts and make imprints on a sheet of old newspaper. Let dry.
- Child to place his/ her favourite animal toys and make it look like a jungle. Alternatively, child may paste glue on the animal images and paste them on the newspaper to make a collage.
- Talk to the child about the animals. Encourage the child to name the animal and talk about its colour and what sound it makes, how it walks, etc.
- This paper may be used as a gift wrap later.

Block Play

Materials Required:

- Pre-drawn letter 'g' on A4 sheet/ floor/ table top
- Building blocks

How to

- Encourage the child to name the letter and say what sound it makes
- Next, encourage the child to place blocks on the outline of the letter
- As an extension, you may ask the child to place only red blocks on the right side of the table and only yellow blocks on the left side of the table.
- Child to say 'right' when placing on right and 'left' when placing on the left side.

Animal Puzzles

Materials Required:

- Wild animal pictures from old magazines (e.g. tiger, lion, elephant, leopard, bear, giraffe, deer)
- A pair of child safety scissors

How to

- Encourage the child to look for pictures of wild animals from old magazines and name them.
- The child to cut the pictures into two, with safety scissors, under parental supervision.
- Now, the child should be encouraged to put the picture puzzle together, name the animal and identify its colour and talk about its patterns and characteristics.
