About the Conference

In the twenty-first century, interdisciplinary studies have come to attain a central epistemological position within the domain of social sciences in contrast to its erstwhile peripheral status in academia. This process of evolution reflected post-war efforts to overcome disciplinary isolation by integrating insights from multiple fields like History, Economics, Anthropology, Political Science, Sociology etc. This shift emerged prominently in the mid-twentieth century, especially in the applied fields such as Industrial Relations, International Relations, and Public Administration.

Interdisciplinary researches in social sciences emerged as a method and platform for addressing complex social problems and strengthening individual disciplines through collaboration instead of creating a 'discipline specific division'. Interdisciplinary collaboration was seen as essential to address the inadequacies of mono-disciplinary approach, thus fostering problem-oriented research, conceptual innovation and theoretical refinement within the social sciences rather than replacing them.

Currently, a renewed thrust in the social sciences has emerged in response to significant societal transformations, with the acceleration of globalization, digital transformation, climate change, pandemics, migration crises, and the rise of artificial intelligence, which has intensified the complexity of social realities. These challenges are inherently interconnected and demand analytical frameworks that cut across disciplinary boundaries. Contemporary social science research increasingly integrates sociology with data science, economics with environmental studies, political science with public health, and history with digital humanities. Global policy agendas such as the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) further institutionalize interdisciplinary studies by explicitly linking social equity, economic growth, environmental sustainability and governance. Thus, interdisciplinary research today is not merely problem-oriented but also policy-relevant, future-facing, and ethically grounded enabling scholars to engage with real-world transformations in a rapidly changing global order.

The Adamas University Social Science Conference 2026 aims to address and respond to the current thrust for a comprehensive understanding of society by providing a dynamic interdisciplinary platform to critically examine the contemporary social realities across disciplines. Professor Thomas Pogge

Director, Yale Global Justice Program

Leitner Professor of Philosophy and International Affairs, Yale University

Professor Thomas Pogge is the Leitner Professor of Philosophy and Professor of Political Science at Yale University and founding Director of the Global Justice Program. His research focuses on global justice, human rights, and the ethics of global institutions. He is the co-founder of Academics Stand Against Poverty (ASAP) and Incentives for Global Health, initiatives addressing global poverty and access to medicines. A member of the Norwegian Academy of Science and Letters, he is widely known for his influential book *World Poverty and Human Rights*. His work explores the moral responsibilities of global institutions in addressing inequality and poverty.

Panel Theme I

Reimagining Political Thought: Indian and Global Perspectives

Since the dawn of civilisation till contemporary times, Political Thought/Political Philosophy is an essential part of human history. It has performed, to quote Rajeev Bhargava, "both explanatory and normative functions". It provides analytical framework to comprehend political phenomena, explains at the most general level possible, evaluates and prescribes what we should do and also speculates about our present and future condition. It guides policy-making, fosters critical thinking on justice and rights, and enables citizens to evaluate governments' legitimacy and engage in collective action – both in the context of specific state and the world as a whole.

Concepts from political thought are applied to contemporary issues such as globalisation, identity politics, and social justice. It facilitates the study of diverse political systems of the world, including the Indian, and, in many cases from post-colonial perspectives. It continues to inspire movements and provide tools for navigating political constraints. It facilitates the study of political systems and global politics from different theoretical perspectives, which often stand in opposition to each other.

In India, there is a rich legacy of Political Thought from the ancient days of Mahabharata and Arthashastra to the modern era emerged under the colonial rule: through the medieval period of Sultanate and Mughal rule. On the other hand, with the rise of modern nation-states in the West, 'politics among nations', to quote Morgenthau, also began to occupy the attention of the political thinkers. This branch of Political Thought has also set the tradition of explanation, evaluation and speculation about International/Global politics from different perspectives from idealist to Realist, Neo-Realist to Constructivist, Behavioural to Postmodern and so on.

In the proposed panel, some of the leading political scientists will engage themselves with some of the significant issues concerning Political Thought in the context of India as well as the World.

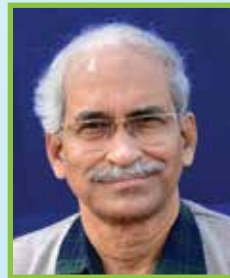

Panel Theme II

Strategic Autonomy vs. Economic Integration: Navigating India's Role in the 2026 Global Trade Architecture.

For the most part of the last thirty years, the international trade was dominated by WTO-led globalization. Cost efficiency was considered more important than security implications and ideological similarities. However, in 2026, the global trade landscape is no longer a unified highway with only economic objectives. It is now divided along several fault lines such as geopolitical alignment, technological standards and, environmental regulation. The world thus remains split in two broad spheres: the western bloc and a rising and diverse global south. Given the increasingly unpredictable state of affairs, India finds itself at crossroads, having to navigate through economic and geopolitical pressure points. On one hand, India attempts to preserve policy sovereignty and counter threats of external tariffs, while on the other, it wants to align with international standards, global supply chains, gain market access and attract manufacturing. In other words, India's strategic autonomy is not one of isolation but of leveraging the market size on own terms to clinch economic windfalls within an otherwise protectionist world. India's success in 2026, thus, depends on translating this strategic intent into operational outcomes.

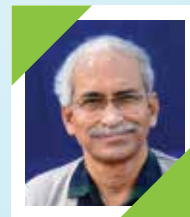
